

SBAC/NGSS Testing Schedule

We will administer state assessments starting at the end of March. Utilizing an adjusted bell schedule, we want to ensure adequate time is provided for our testing sessions. We request that students report to school with headphones or earbuds with a jack plug (hard-lined) connection for our testing dates. Requesting Support with Digital Distractions and Social Media

We are requesting your support with personal devices and social media. Students are provided with a locker to secure their personal devices until the end of the school day. Doing so removes theft, inappropriate use, and damage of personal devices from the school day. We are continually running into challenges with cell phones, smart watches, and airpods. We have communicated our expectations to students repeatedly throughout the school year; however, it continues to be an issue.

We understand that remaining connected is a new societal norm but please utilize the proper channels during school hours. For example, if your child is not feeling well, we kindly request that they utilize the

school nurse. Our nurses will assess your child and reach out with any concerns. If there is a non-health related reason that your child needs to contact you during school hours, please have them utilize a house office to do so. We appreciate your support in reinforcing our school procedures.

On occasion airpods/earpods are permitted in the classroom setting, this is for educational purposes and intended to be utilized with the EPS-issued iPad. If not explicitly permitted by the educator for instructional purposes, they are not to be worn. The



teaching and learning process may look different than it did just a decade ago; however, one item that has not changed and remains at the center of this process is *communication*. We cannot properly educate your child if they are not tuned-in to classroom instruction.

A larger issue facing our school community and nation is adolescent use of social media and screentime. We are happy that Connecticut has taken steps to hold large tech firms accountable in working toward



passing legislation that would regulate minors accessing social media. Essentially, parents/guardians would need to grant access for their *minor* to create and access social media accounts. We strongly support this movement as predatory targeting of minors within the digital landscape is prevalent. Furthermore, we sometimes find that middle school aged children get

wrapped up in negative digital citizenship (our curriculum addresses digital citizenship). These interactions transpire 24 hours a day 365 days a year – managing and/or regulating these interactions, moreover their implications, is *extremely* challenging. The administrative time spent investigating avoidable and perpetuated interactions outside of our control is cumbersome. Inevitably, our resources and energy are detracted from the *vital* work at hand.

Our public schools welcome *all* - we fully embrace and have dedicated our professional careers to educating the future of our nation. As 1,200 students enter our school doors, every child is different and faces varying circumstances. We attempt to mitigate and proactively curtail negative behaviors that may prove detrimental to our school community: this is <u>not</u> an easy endeavor. We strive to keep the focus on educating your child. We want to provide them with the skills and foundation to experience success in high school and beyond. We want to do this in a positive, educationally conducive learning environment. As *educators*, we feel keeping you informed as *parents* of items that are developing or proving detrimental to *our* school community is essential.

If you are not already doing so, we urge you to monitor your child's social media presence and digital interactions for their protection. Lastly, your support with the above-mentioned items is vital to our success as a school community and beyond appreciated by our faculty and staff.

This spring the Smarter Balanced Assessments in English/literacy and mathematics will be administered to all students in Grades 3 through 8 as part of Connecticut's summative assessment system. The Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) Assessment will be administered to students in Grades 5, 8, and 11. Grade 11 students will also participate in the SAT School Day testing. The assessment windows for these tests will be opening soon. Individual schools will provide specific information as to the testing dates for your student(s).

Teachers and administrators anticipate that the analysis of assessment results will provide valuable information about students' instructional needs and strengths, as well as the ongoing effectiveness of our program and pedagogy in Enfield.
